1 Not many of you should become teachers, my fellow believers, because you know that we who teach will be judged more strictly.2 We all stumble in many ways. Anyone who is never at fault in what they say is perfect, able to keep their whole body in check.

3 When we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we can turn the whole animal. 4 Or take ships as an example. Although they are so large and are driven by strong winds, they are steered by a very small rudder wherever the pilot wants to go. 5 Likewise, the tongue is a small part of the body, but it makes great boasts. Consider what a great forest is set on fire by a small spark. 6 The tongue also is a fire, a world of evil among the parts of the body. It corrupts the whole body, sets the whole course of one's life on fire, and is itself set on fire by hell.

I. Recognize the Dunamis of the Tongue Psalm 141:3-4 NIV



3 Set a guard over my mouth, LORD; keep watch over the door of my lips.

4 Do not let my heart be drawn to what is evil so that I take part in wicked deeds along with those who are evildoers; do not let me eat their delicacies.





1 Peter 3:10 NIV

10 For,

"Whoever would love life and see good days must keep their tongue from evil and their lips from deceitful speech.



II. Recognize the Destructiveness of the Tongue James 3:5b-8 NIV



5b Consider what a great forest is set on fire by a small spark. 6 The tongue also is a fire, a world of evil among the parts of the body. It corrupts the whole body, sets the whole course of one's life on fire, and is itself set on fire by hell.

7 All kinds of animals, birds, reptiles and sea creatures are being tamed and have been tamed by mankind, 8 but no human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison.



II. Recognize the Destructiveness of the Tongue Proverbs 26:18-19 NIV



18 Like a maniac shooting
flaming arrows of death
19 is one who deceives their neighbor and says, "I was only joking!"



II. Recognize the Destructiveness of the Tongue Matthew 15:16-19 NIV



16 "Are you still so dull?" Jesus asked them. 17 "Don't you see that whatever enters the mouth goes into the stomach and then out of the body? 18 But the things that come out of a person's mouth come from the heart, and these defile them. 19 For out of the heart come evil thoughts—murder, adultery, sexual immorality, theft, false testimony, slander.




III. Recognize the Duplicity of the Tongue James 3:9-12 NIV



9 With the tongue we praise our Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings, who have been made in God's likeness. 10 Out of the same mouth come praise and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this should not be. 11 Can both fresh water and salt water flow from the same spring? 12 My brothers and sisters, can a fig tree bear olives, or a grapevine bear figs? 13 "Their throats are open graves;

their tongues practice deceit."

"The poison of vipers is on their lips."

14 "Their mouths are full of cursing and bitterness."



III. Recognize the Duplicity of the Tongue Proverbs 10:19-21 NIV



- 19 Sin is not ended by multiplying words, but the prudent hold their tongues.
- 20 The tongue of the righteous is choice silver, but the heart of the wicked is of little value.
- 21 The lips of the righteous nourish many, but fools die for lack of sense.



III. Recognize the Duplicity of the Tongue Proverbs 12:18-21 NIV



18 The words of the reckless pierce like swords, but the tongue of the wise brings healing. 19 Truthful lips endure forever, but a lying tongue lasts only a moment. 20 Deceit is in the hearts of those who plot evil, but those who promote peace have joy. 21 No harm overtakes the righteous, but the wicked have their fill of trouble.



III. Recognize the Duplicity of the Tongue Proverbs 12:22-25 NIV



- 22 The LORD detests lying lips, but he delights in people who are trustworthy.
- 23 The prudent keep their knowledge to themselves, but a fool's heart blurts out folly.
- 24 Diligent hands will rule, but laziness ends in forced labor.
- 25 Anxiety weighs down the heart, but a kind word cheers it up.



III. Recognize the Duplicity of the Tongue Matthew 12:33-37 NIV



33 "Make a tree good and its fruit will be good, or make a tree bad and its fruit will be bad, for a tree is recognized by its fruit. 34 You brood of vipers, how can you who are evil say anything good? For the mouth speaks what the heart is full of. 35 A good man brings good things out of the good stored up in him, and an evil man brings evil things out of the evil stored up in him. 36 But I tell you that everyone will have to give account on the day of judgment for every empty word they have spoken. 37 For by your words you will be acquitted, and by your words you will be condemned."



III. Recognize the Duplicity of the Tongue Hebrews 13:8 NIV



Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever.



III. Recognize the Duplicity of the Tongue Philippians 2:9-11 NIV



9 Therefore God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name,
10 that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth,
11 and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.
